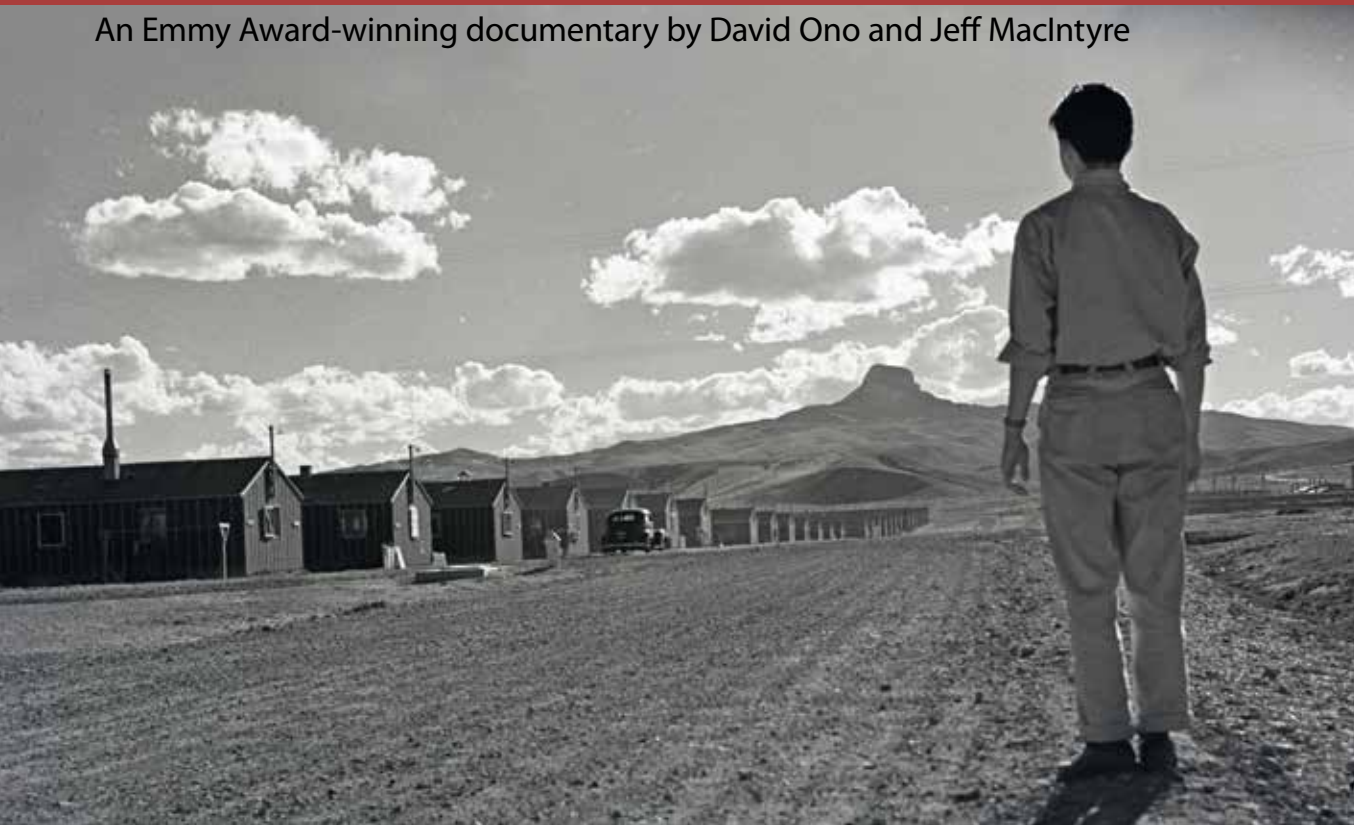

To recognize the Day of Remembrance, the Museum will host a screening of the documentary *The Legacy of Heart Mountain*, which examines the Japanese American experience in a Wyoming prison camp. During the presentation the Museum will also display artifacts made and used in these camps. The film screening will be followed by a panel discussion and a spoken-word performance by 2014 National Poetry Slam champion G. Yamazawa.

The Legacy of Heart Mountain recalls the lives of Japanese Americans held captive in a Wyoming prison camp during World War II. Ten thousand Japanese and Japanese American citizens were imprisoned there, behind barbed wire and under the watch of armed guards, solely because of their heritage.
